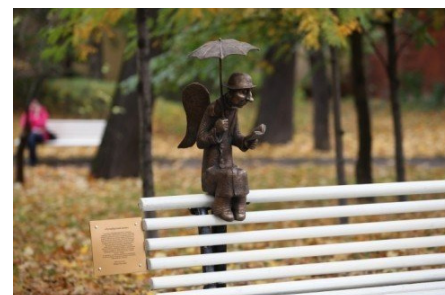
The tower of Babel of the technogenic era
